


The Oneness of God

Beliefs about God

- Sunni and Shi'a Muslims believe that there is only one God; Tawhid.
- Islam is a monotheistic religion.
- The Arabic word for God is Allah.
- The Shahadah shows the belief in one God. "There is one God but Allah and Muhammad is his prophet."
- God is an undivided entity.
- No one else and no other object has God's attributes or qualities.
- The only sin that God will not forgive is the sin of shirk. Which is attributing God-like qualities to any other being or thing.

"He is God the One, God the eternal. He begot no one nor was He begotten. No one is comparable to hum."

"You who believe, obey God and the Messenger."

They show their belief in their daily lives.

They make God their number 1 priority

Live according to God's will

They worship God

The impact of these beliefs on Muslims

"Misfortunes can only happen with God's permission."

They respect the prophets (not worship them)

Muslims accept that bad things happen and they are 'meant to be'

The Supremacy of God's will

- God is the creator therefore nothing happens unless God allows it, whether it is good or bad.
- Everything happens under God's will.
- The supremacy of God's will is an article of faith.
- God's will is supreme and above all things.
- Muslims often add the words 'God willing'
 (Inshallah) after they promise to do something.
- This lead to the belief that God controls
 everything and humans do not have Free Will.

Key beliefs of Sunni and Shi'a Islam

Sunni Islam Shi'a Islam

- When Muhammad died, Sunni Muslims believe that the Qur'an and the Sunnah had the authority to guide Muslims.
- They elected Abu Bakr to be their leader (Caliph) to make sure people follow God's laws.
- The Caliph's don't make the laws, they enforce them.
- Sunni meaning followers of the Sunnah.

- Shi'a Muslims believe that Muhammad had names his cousin Ali as his successor.
- Ali and his supporters thought that the true leaders (Imams)
 had to be descendants of Muhammad and chosen by God.
- Shi'a Muslims only accept the sayings of Muhammad that have been passed to Ali or his followers.

Tawhid- The belief in one God.

Holy Books- The Qur'an is the highest authority Angels- the Communication from God to humans.

'God is the greatest':


Every day Muslims hear and say the words 'Allahu Akbar' meaning God is the greatest.

The names of God

- God has revealed himself to the people through Muhammad and the Holy Books.
- There are 99 names of God in the Qur'an.
- These names help Muslims to understand God's nature.
- Many Muslims memorise the names of God and recite them when praying.
- They help Muslims to feel God's presence.

"The Most Excellent Names belong to God: use them to call on Him."

"He is with you wherever you are."



Merciful: He understands suffering, cares for them and forgives if they are truly sorry.

Immanent: Within all things and close to his people



Justice and Fair: He treats people fairly and justly, and requires Muslims to do the same. Links to the Day of Judgement.

Beneficent: Source of all goodness. Life and the Earth is a gift.

Omnipotent: He is the creator, sustainer and owner or all things. He is all powerful

Transcendent: Beyond all things

Angels

The belief in angels in Islam is called Malaikah



Beliefs about Angels

- One of the six articles for Sunni Islam.
- Angels are part of the unseen world.
- Created from light.
- Receive God's word and pass them to the prophets.
- They are pure and sinless.
- They do not have free will.
- They live to please and worship God.
- The power to take human form. Example-Ibrahim's story and Mary (appeared as men)


Preaestination

Predestination-The idea that **God** knows everything and **determines** everything that will happen in the universe.



Link to Human Freedom

- Shi'a Muslims believe that God knows all but does not decide all- meaning we have free will/ choice.
- God is the creator of time and therefore is not bound by it. He is outside of time. This means he knows what has happened, is happening and what will happen.
- Humans act freely and God just knows what they will do.



"Only what God has decreed will happen to us. He is our Master: let the believers put their trust in God."

What is it?

- God has everything written down that determines everything that is going to happen in the universe,
- It is written in the 'book of decrees'.
- · Links to the supremacy of God's will

The Day of Judgement

- God will **judge** humans for their actions on Earth.
- This is why God has given humans
 free will, to make judgement fair.
- He will punish those for their bad choices and reward those for the good.
- God puts the responsibility back to people even though he knows what they are going to do.

"God does not change the condition of a people [for the worse] unless they change what is in themselves."

Life after death

Akhirah:

The belief in everlasting life after death.

Beliefs about life after death

- Muslims believe that when they die a person still has a conscious existence in the grave.
- They enter a state of waiting called barzakh which means barrier.
- The are waiting for the day of judgement.
- While lying in the grave, God will send two angels to question them about their faith. This results in their rewards and punishments.
- Others believe that they will stay in their graves until the end of the world when the day of judgement will come.

Accept suffering and know what God will provide justice


Prophethood and Adam

What is a prophet?

- Prophets are God's chosen people to bring the message of Islam to people.
- Belief in prophets is known as Risalah.
- Method of communication between God and humans.
- God gives instructions to prophets to teach people about how he wants them to live.
- The are considered role models to believers.
- They are good people who live according to God's will.

Prophet Adam

- First man on earth and the first prophet of Islam.
- Created by God from the dust of the ground.
- Father of the human race.
- God taught Adam the names of all things.
- God then asked Adan to teach the angels. The angels then bowed to him
- Iblis (the Devil) refused to bow and was thrown out of paradise and he vowed to tempt humans to sin.
- God created Eve (Hawwa) for Adam and they lived in the garden of Eden.
- Iblis deceived them into disobeying God and eating from the tree.
- They were thrown from paradise and brought sin into the world.

Prophet Muhammad and the Imamate

Muhammad

Muhammad's Life

- He is known as the last and greatest prophet.
- Born in Mecca, was an orphan and married a wealthy widow, Khadija at the age of 25.
- Angel Jibril appeared to him with a message from God. For more that 20 years, Muhammad received further revelations from God making the Qur'an.

Muhammad's preaching

- After his revelation, Muhammad proclaimed that God is one.
- He challenged the people of Mecca to give up cheating, gambling, drinking and idol worship.
- Muhammad fled persecution with his followers to Madinah in 622CE.
- This was the start of Hajj and Ummah.
- After the night journey, Muhammad gathered a tribe of 10,000 Muslims converts and conquered the city in the name of Allah.


The Night Journey

- Muhammad recorded this in the Qur'an.
- The angel Jibril took Muhammad to Jerusalem on a horse-like creature with wings.
- He then ascended into heaven and spoke to God and the past prophets.
- Isa (Jesus) told Muhammad that people should pray 5 times a day.

The Imamate

- When Muhammed died, Muslim's split into two groups, Shi'a and Sunni.
- Shi'a believe that Muhammad named Ali, his successor- he became the first Imam.
- Shi'a believe that Ali appointed him by divine instruction and therefore leadership should follow in the family line.
- The Twelver branch of Shi'a Islam believes that there have been 12 Imams in total.
- Muhammad al-Mahdi was the last Imam and kept alive and hidden somewhere on earth and will return with Jesus to bring justice and
 equality.
- The Imams rule justly and are also the only people who can interpret the Qur'an without fault.

The The Contents The importance Qur'an

- Mixture of historical accounts and advice on how to follow God.
- It begins with a short prayer to God and is used in the daily prayers.
- Arranged in length of chapters.
- Muslim children are encouraged to learn Arabic so they can read the Quran.

- Word of God
- Foundation of every believer's faith.
- Most sacred text of Islam.
- Infallible source of authority.
- Written in perfect Arabic.
- Original is in heaven, so when Muslims read it they believe God is directly speaking to them.

The Torah (Tawrat)
Revealed to Moses (Musa).
It is mentioned 18 times in the
Qur'an.



The Psalms (Zabur)
Revealed to David.
It is mentioned 3 times in the
Qur'an. Similar to Psalms in the Bible.



The Gospel (Injil)
Revealed to Jesus (Isa)
It is believed to been lost but some messages can be found in the Bible.
Mentioned 12 times in the Qur'an



The Scrolls of Abraham (Ibrahim)
Referred to in the Qur'an but have
been lost and no longer exist.
Revealed to Ibrahim.
