#### FLYING THE FLAG FOR THE COMMONWEALTH Message from The Mayor's Office

Local authorities throughout the United Kingdom will once again fly the Commonwealth Flag for 24 hours from 10.00am on Monday 14 March 2022. The ceremony continues to represent an ideal time to celebrate the true value of the Commonwealth as an increasingly multi-cultural world seeks unity, understanding and tolerance. Fly a Flag for the Commonwealth has become a truly international event, with a whole host of vibrant celebrations reflecting the cultural identities of a total population of more than two billion people. Each country will raise its flag in recognition of a remarkable organisation that fosters shared values in democracy, human rights and the rule of law. In Solihull the Commonwealth Flag will be raised from the flagpole on top of the Council House and I would once again like to allow pupils from our schools and academies the honour of giving the command to hoist the flag at a small ceremony.

This year's competition is very special as we are launching it in partnership with **Solihull Schools' Year of the Commonwealth Games** and we would like to see everyone coming together under the banner of sport. One of the elements of the Commonwealth Games' Vision Statement is that they will "Bring People Together" and it is this important aspect of the Games that we would like to take as our theme this year.

#### **Karting Success**



Harrison is a paid works driver for AirKart.

Harrison is the youngest driver with the team and has progressed to becoming a full works driver this year after achieving significant success last year. He is one of the youngest drivers in the Junior Kart Class, racing karts capable of well over 70mph.

The series has a 31-year history of providing a multitude of champions including Jenson Button and has huge coverage both in the UK and Overseas. Races were live streamed and they have lead to opportunities to represent the UK internationally.

Harrison has been Karting since 2018. He keeps it low profile, but he is very dedicated to the sport and constantly trains and works to improve and develop.

Harrison is also very successful, last year his achievements included:

- Overall champion for Hunts Kart Racing Club Minimax
- Double podiums in Superone in the two guest rounds he raced in
- 5<sup>th</sup> out of 50 drivers in the toughest club championship in the UK
- Strong showing at the British Kart Grand Prix

He has close to 4000 followers on Instagram, a dedicated website and a strong following on Facebook too. Harrison is out almost every weekend either testing or racing come rain or shine, but always ensures he is up to date with his school work.

Working with AirKart, Harrison is representing a young British race team that is taking on feeder teams from the likes of F1 teams such as Mercedes. Indeed, one of Harrison's older rivals has just joined the works Mercedes team as a full-time paid driver at the age of 15 !



Being a Works Race driver for a team at the age of 12 is huge for Harrison, it is a major step for him to pursue his dream of becoming a professional racing driver. Nationwide coverage will boost his profile significantly, ready for next year when the team plan to race in Europe.

Chiara has been offered a place at Brasenose College, Oxford, Charlie has been accepted by the Army and Owen has an unconditional apprenticeship offer for an audit role at Grant Thornton and wrote a great piece to encourage other students in the school Careers Newsletter.


#### **ABK Drama**
