ABK ELECTION 2024

To celebrate UK democracy Alderbrook School held its own General Election on Thursday 4th July.

Ignited by Miss Sudworth's enthusiasm, five of Alderbrook's Year 12 Politics students were selected to represent each of the five largest parties contesting seats in England.

Videos and PowerPoint resources were created to canvass for votes across the lower school, and last Thursday, from 7:00am to 4:00pm 68% (beating the national turnout!) of Alderbrook students made their voices heard.

To best replicate the First Past the Post system, form groups took the place of constituencies, and despite Reform UK winning the most individual forms, ultimately, they fell short of a majority.

A coalition government made up of Labour, the Greens, and the Liberal Democrats won the day.

It was wonderful to see so many young people enthused by the event, and arguing passionately about the direction of their country – and perhaps most crucially of all, they learnt how to vote in as accurate a replica of a polling station as M07 could manage!



DUKE of EDINBURGH AWARD

Nine ex-students attended the Gold Award Celebration Event at Buckingham Palace Gardens in May. Aisha's mother shared her thoughts for the day "it was a wonderful experience as a parent to see our young people flourish and mingle with royalty".

Thirty-eight further students completed the Gold Award. Despite it being July, the students had to demonstrate resilience to overcome all the elements of rain, gale force winds and some eventual sunshine.

Twenty-seven students completed two Bronze expeditions, one in Bromsgrove and surrounding areas and one in the Peak District. This came with its challenges as students navigated their way through unfamiliar territory to reach the finish line after a night camping out away from home. A great time had by all!

Well done to all the participants - you were very brave indeed!




WORLD CHALLENGE

After two years of fundraising and preparation, 14 students will be embarking on their two-week World Challenge expedition to eSwatini in the South of Africa.

This experience is designed to develop tomorrow's leaders by building resilience, leadership and teamwork in our learners.

Since October 2022, students have prepared through distance and incline training walks along the Grand Union Canal and in both the Malvern and Shropshire Hills. A range of fundraising activities occurred, from bake sales to the infamous Friday Night Fun events for Y7 and Y8. This time students could compete in the night-orienteering and Super Smash Bros tournament to win prizes kindly donated by Krispy Kreme, Jamaya and Nando's.

This expedition will have the students tackling education and construction community projects, learning crafts, dances, and cooking skills from our hosts, and surviving in the wilderness while wild-camping on a four-day trek along the Ngwempisi River. The final days will end with some R&R in Kruger National Park experiencing night and early morning safaris, hoping to spot the Big 5!



WPR PROJECT

We are so happy to be developing our careers provision with an award-winning, Birmingham based PR company - WPR. This partnership has hit the ground running with some truly impactful events and resources, and is the start of the answer to some of the challenges schools face with their careers programmes – consistent contacts, and effective, interactive activities. WPR joined us in helping to deliver our vision of fostering ambition, providing inspiration and informing students of their choices.

A year on, we introduced an in-school experience of the workplace, where Y8 students were exposed to the world of PR. With 75% of students not knowing what PR was at the start of the day and 60% now potentially considering it as a career choice, an additional 14% *definitely* considering it, we can only describe the day as inspiring, engaging and a great success.

A Y12 mentoring project developed students' professional communication skills and independence, and students completed placements on the well-established work experience programme ran by WPR. We have developed complete Schemes of Work within Y7 English and Y10 iMedia, linking curriculum learning to the world of work, and creating opportunities for meaningful encounters with employees, where students can receive valuable feedback from industry professionals.

After such a passionate start we hope to continue developing our curriculum resources further, creating a model that can be rolled out across departments. WPR themselves have been impressed with the standard of student at Alderbrook School, the passion they demonstrate and their innovative and wacky ideas.



50th ANNIVERSARY OF ALDERBROOK SCHOOL

In 1965, the comprehensive system was introduced by the government. This involved the merging of grammar schools and secondary modern schools across Solihull with the aim to form a mixed ability set of students.

Alderbrook was one of these schools and to celebrate our 50th anniversary milestone, we held a celebration party.

Present and past members of staff across the whole school were invited to attend.

We had a massive turnout and it was a lovely opportunity to share past memories and to see the changes and improvements to the site.

This year, the Drama Department took place in the National Theatre Connections programme for the third year in a row. We performed two shows in the Edge Theatre and we were visited by a professional director who gave us feedback before transferring our show to the Royal and Derngate Theatre in April. On the day, as well as performing our show to other schools and youth groups, we participated in a workshop on how AI could be used to in rehearsals. SPANISH OUTSIDE OF THE CLASSROOM

At Alderbrook we believe that language learning does not only occur within the vacuum of the classroom. Therefore, we have sought to provide inspiring opportunities to engage our students in Hispanic culture this academic year whilst developing the cross curricular links our subject naturally lends itself to.

We once again had the pleasure of inviting the Onatti Theatre Company to perform to our Year 9 and Year 10 students.

This was well received by the cohort, who enthusiastically engaged with the Spanish language production *Reserva duplicada* and who had the opportunity to participate in a question and answers session with the actors afterwards. We were very impressed that many students chose to ask their questions in Spanish. We are looking forward to welcoming Onatti Theatre Company back to Alderbrook next year.

Furthermore, all Spanish students were offered the opportunity to explore the history of Flamenco thanks to our partnership with Ana Garcia.

The students who took part in the workshop not only deepened their cultural knowledge of Spain but also engaged their dance skills by performing a Flamenco routine.



SHREWSBURY PRISON

Year 13 Sociology and Criminology students visited Shrewsbury Prison in January. The prison which became decommissioned in March 2013 is still open to visitors and students were able to apply their learning from the classroom to the prison. They explored concepts such as how the media portray crime and criminals, forms of punishment including custodial sentencing and the effectiveness of prisons.

As part of their day student attempted an escape room from one of the cells – unfortunately for them, Miss Jones and Miss Crowther-Green came out victorious.





WEST MIDLAND SAFARI PARK

Year 12 Psychology students attended a workshop at West Midlands Safari Park in June where they explored how phobias develop and are treated using psychological principles. They put these to the test with some of the resident creepy crawlies! Beth and Evie were amongst some of the bravest handling stick insects and rats. Even Mrs Hobbs had a go!

Students were later able to apply their understanding of how behaviours can be shaped and modified using psychological theory whilst watching the sea lion show!

SEND RESEARCH

In January, we wrote to our parents with students that have a diagnosis of autism to invite them to participate in research conducted by Aston University to understand Autism and effective interventions regarding SEMH. Whilst we are not affiliated with the research, the outcome of the study will be shared with us.

We are keen to stay up to date with the latest findings so that we can provide evidence based interventions that support our children.

FRIDAY QUIZ CLUB

In January, we launched Friday Lunchtime Quiz Club which is led by the students for the students. They have organised some excellent power points to deliver the quiz each week.

We have been blown away by the detail, creativity and the determination to make the club a success; involving one another to create a place of inclusion and community. Quiz themes are chosen by the children and there are no winners, as everyone wins for their participation and working together as part of a team. We very much look forward to watching Quiz Club evolve in the next academic year.

A huge well done and thank you to each and every one of our students that have organised and delivered a quiz and a special thank you to the students that support by attending each week during 2024.

SEND STUDENT VOICE

Students have demonstrated the power of having their voice heard and working with professionals to inform and make change happen. Students have been busy during the Summer Term completing sensory audits, interview panels, and providing helpful information to inform the transition for the year 6s.

Special mention to Yvie, Jenson, Kurt and Charlie for their excellent efforts in supporting year 6 transition workshops.

The SEND student voice will form an integral part of our work within the Student Development team in the upcoming academic year and we look forward to working alongside our students to continue to develop our inclusive practice.


ANXIETY UNCOVERED WORKSHOPS

We now provide 40 of our SEND students with a 5 week programme of "in the wild" workshops. These workshops have taken place outdoors promoting the wellbeing of our students in a fun and interactive way through a series of carefully planned activities in nature.

Students had the opportunity to plant, to paint, to create, to be free to sit and admire their surroundings while learning important wellbeing tools that they can take away and build on. The students have enjoyed the opportunity to be working outdoors, learning more about the scientific benefits for both body and mind.



There were a number of other firsts in this production too. We incorporated dry ice, and a staging frame that added four new levels to the production. This enabled students to access the space and climb up to the full height of the proscenium arch, adding to the range of dynamics and movement. The school recently invested in a set of radio microphones, and it was great to integrate them too, saving us about £1000 off the production costs.

Overall, it was great to see a diverse and broad ranging team perform to such a high standard, and embrace 1970s rock music in our 50th Anniversary year!
